Vicki will serve as a Senior Research Associate for a recently earned National Science Foundation (NSF) grant titled "Using Networks to Scale Improvement of STEM Undergraduate Education: A Comparative Study of Network Goals, Processes, and Strategies to Advance Organizational Change." This is a four-year grant in partnership with Michigan State University totaling \$1.8 million.

Nels Christensen (English) presented a creative nonfiction essay entitled "He Not from Albion" at the biennial conference of The Association for the Study of Literature and the Environment (ASLE).

Drew Christopher (Psychological Science) is the recipient of the Society for Personality and Social Psychology's 2017 Teaching and Mentoring Award. The award was designed to recognize excellence in teaching and mentoring among faculty at colleges and universities that do not have Ph.D. programs in social and/or personality psychology.

Glenn Deutsch (English) adjudicated four collegiate categories in this year's Milwaukee Press Club Awards for Excellence in Wisconsin Journalism Contest: Best Blog, Best Local News or Feature Website, Best Website Design, and Best Investigative Reporting.

In June, the Albion College French section received a Tournées Film Festival prize awarded by the French-American Cultural Exchange Foundation to support a French Film Festival at the Bohm Theater in November. **Dianne Guenin-Lelle** (Modern Languages & Cultures) was awarded two Médailles de la Ville, one from Noisy-le-Roi as well as one from Bailly for her work on Sister City relations with Albion in June.

Scott Hendrix (Academic Skills/Writing Center) led a presentation and discussion on basic writing pedagogy--"We Have to Start Trusting Our Students: Working toward Antiracist, Social Justice Pedagogy"--at the College Composition and Communication summer conference *Diverse Writers, Diverse Writing*, University of Cincinnati, Clermont, OH, June 8-10, 2017.

In May, **Nicolle Zellner** (Physics) represented Albion College and NASA as a speaker for the Solar System Ambassador program at the Odyssey of the Mind World Championships at Michigan State University. She spoke to almost 1500 people about Moon rocks (including Michigan's Apollo 11 "goodwill sample"), her career as a planetary scientist and professor, and the Great American Solar Eclipse. She gave away over 1200 solar eclipse glasses in 2.5 days.

In June, Nicolle attended Women in Astronomy IV in Austin, TX, and she also attended the Global Liberal Arts Alliance Workshop for Science and Engineering Faculty in Deree, Greece (with **Lisa Lewis**, Chemistry).

In July, Nicolle and **Vanessa McCaffrey** (Chemistry) presented a poster at the XVIIIth International Conference on the Origin of Life in San Diego. The title of their poster, with two student co-authors, was "Assessing the Abundances of Sugar Molecules on Comet Nuclei."

Nicolle also participated in two NASA proposal review panels.
